# WHAT IS THE ELIGIBILITY CENTER?

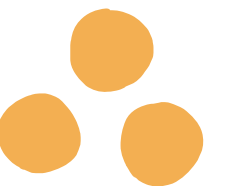
**A unit within the NCAA

meet NCAA Eligibility Center:**

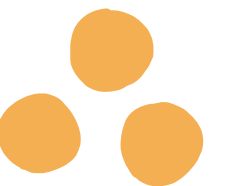
- Academic initial-eligibility requirements

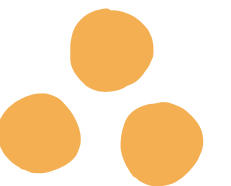

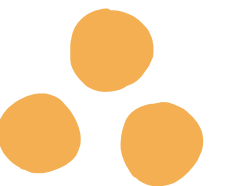


# PROFILE PAGE ACCOUNT



**A free Profile Page account is the right account if you are a college-bound student-athlete who is:**

- In high school and staying connected to receive the most current information from the NCAA Eligibility Center.
- In middle school or earlier and wanting to learn more about college athletics.
- Still deciding which NCAA division is right for you.
- Planning to compete at an NCAA Division III school and have only attended a U.S. high school.
- Registering to play at an NCAA-certified nonscholastic basketball event (BBCS, ECAG, AAU).





# AMATEURISM- ONLY CERTIFICATION ACCOUNT

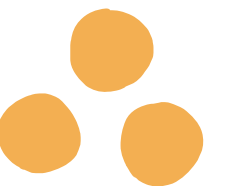



**An Amateurism-Only Certification account is the right account for only a small number of students, including:**

- **International** college-bound student-athletes (first-year students and transfers) planning to compete at an NCAA Division III school.


This account may also be right for **two-** or four-year college transfers who plan to enroll for the first time at an NCAA **Division I or II** school. These students should speak with the compliance staff at the NCAA school they plan to attend to determine which account type is required for their situation.

This account (which does NOT include an academic certification) requires a registration fee of **\$70** for all students.





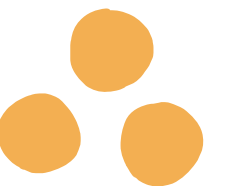
# ACADEMIC AND AMATEURISM CERTIFICATION ACCOUNT



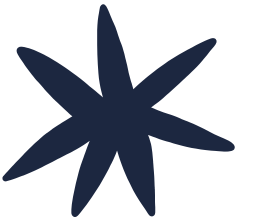
**The most common account for future NCAA student-athletes, an Academic and Amateurism Certification account is the right account for college-bound student-athletes who are planning to:**

- Compete at an NCAA Division I or II school.
- Take an official visit.
- Sign a National Letter of Intent.

This account includes a registration fee of **\$100** for domestic students and **\$160** for International students.

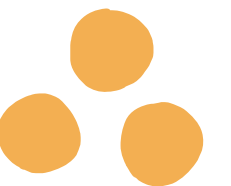

# COLLEGE ADMISSIONS

**You must apply and be accepted to your NCAA Division I or Division II school before you can compete on campus.**

Ask your NCAA school for more information regarding cost of attendance and financial aid.

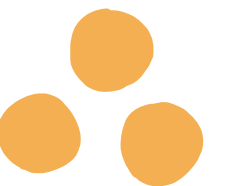




# IRL: INSTITUTION REQUEST LIST

**You must be on an NCAA DI or DII school's Institution Request List to get a certification**

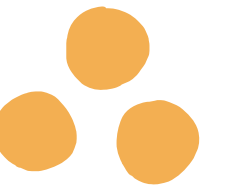
- Apply to NCAA Eligibility Center and have your transcript uploaded
- Get in touch with the coach of the college/university team & ask that they add you to their IRL
- Once placed on one school's IRL, NCAA will be contacted to review and clear your application
- Once application is cleared, it is available to be seen by any other coach
- You only need to be on one school's IRL to be cleared to play at any other school






# SHARED RESPONSIBILITY

**Communicate closely with your high school counselor, coach, parents/guardians, college compliance office, and mentors as you transition to college**

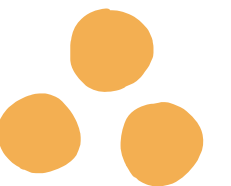
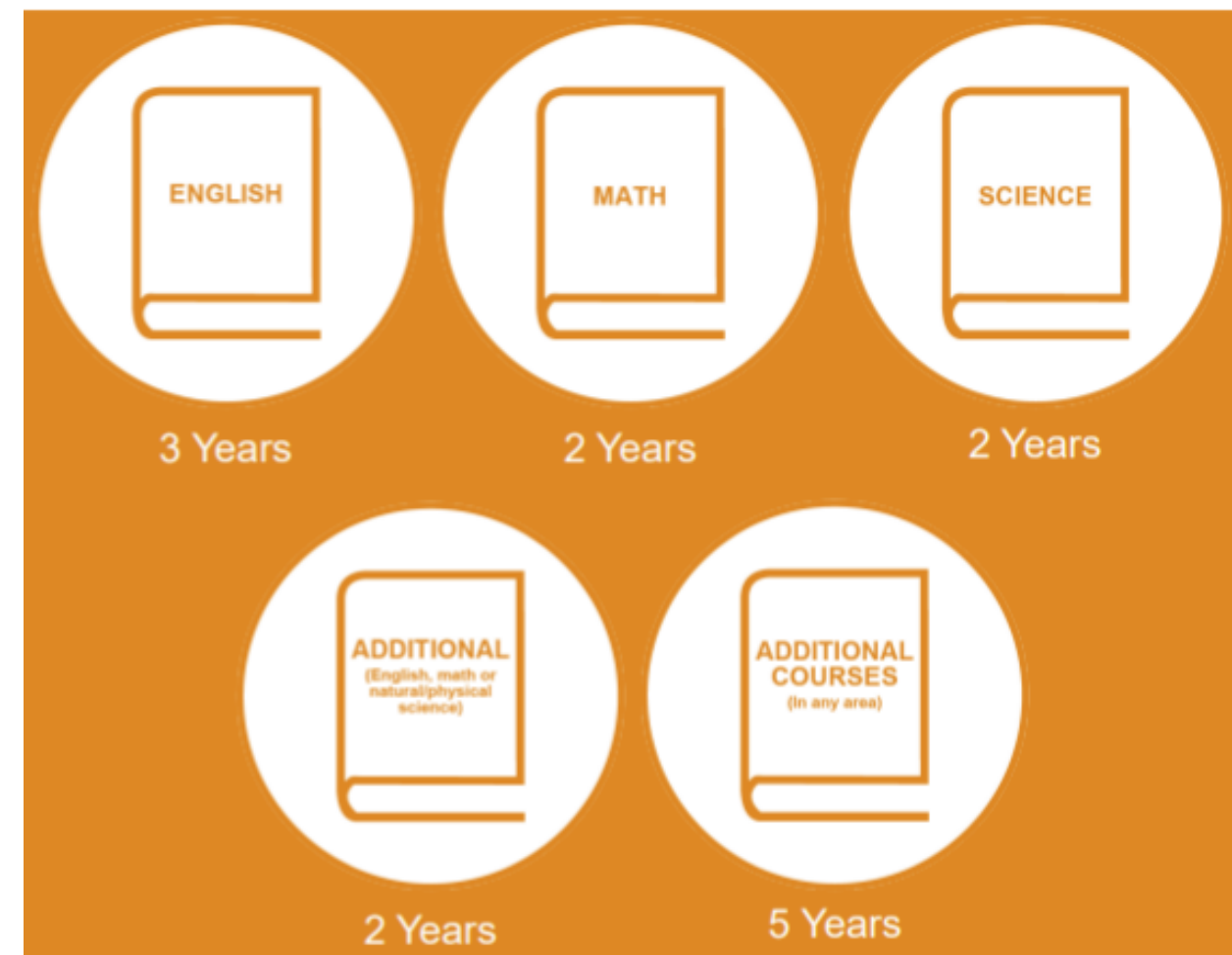


# DIVISION I: EARLY ACADEMIC QUALIFIER

## ATHLETICS AID PRACTICE & COMPETE

*Note: DI early academic qualifier status is based on your pre-seventh semester academic record.*

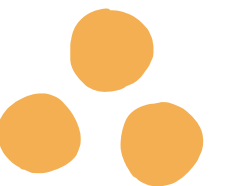
- Complete 14 core-course units in the required subject areas
- Earn a core-course GPA  $\geq 3.0$  in the required subject areas



# DIVISION I: QUALIFIER

## ATHLETICS AID PRACTICE & COMPETE

- Meet core-course progression before starting seventh semester
- Complete 16 core-course units in the required subject areas
- Earn a core-course GPA  $\geq 2.3$  in the required subject areas
- Submit proof of graduation to the Eligibility Center



# DIVISION I: ACADEMIC REDSHIRT

## FIRST YEAR ATHLETICS AID & FIRST TERM PRACTICE

- Complete 16 core-course units in the required subject areas
- Earn a core-course GPA  $\geq 2.0$  in the required subject areas
- Submit proof of graduation to the Eligibility Center





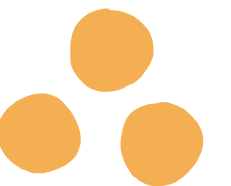


# DIVISION I: NON- QUALIFIER

## NO ATHLETICS AID, NO PRACTICE, NO COMPETE



- DI non-qualifiers are **not eligible** to receive athletics aid, practice, or compete their first year





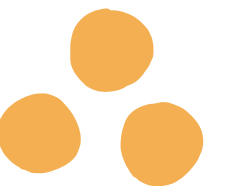


# STANDARDIZED TEST SCORES

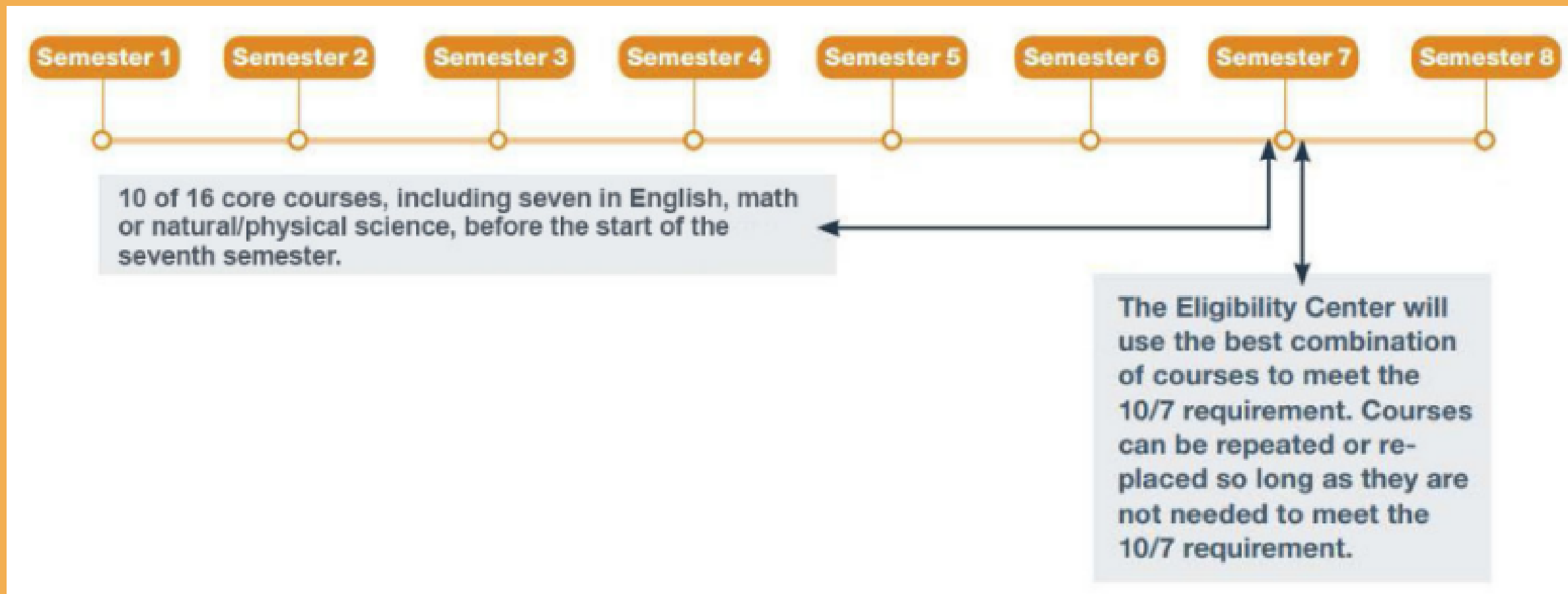
## SAT/ACT

Standardized test scores are **excluded** from NCAA initial-eligibility criteria for student athletes

Colleges and/or scholarship programs may still require test scores for admissions



# CORE-COURSE TIME LIMITATION



- When you enter 9th grade, you have **four years** (eight semesters) to complete your core-course requirements.
- You must graduate on time, with your class.

# EXAMPLE SCHEDULE

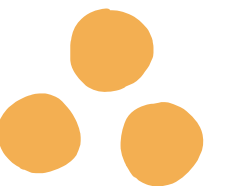





# SPORTS PARTICIPATION


## **When you register for a Certification account, you must:**

- Select the sport(s) you would like to play in college.
- Update your information frequently if you play for multiple teams or attend events outside the traditional high school setting.
- Request final amateurism before you enroll full time at a DI or DII school






# PROACTIVE STUDENT ACTIONS



## If students want to play sports in college, they must:

- Let their counselor know their aspirations as soon as possible
  - Share their NCAA ID with schools recruiting them
  - Apply to schools of their choosing to be accepted
  - Request final amateurism certification before they enroll full time in college
    - Starting April 1 (fall)
    - Starting October (winter/spring)
  - Ask their counselor to submit their final transcript with proof of graduation
  - Know that considerations are given to students with document education-impacting disabilities

# High School Timeline

## 9<sup>th</sup> GRADE REGISTER



- » If you haven't yet, [register](#) for a free Profile Page account at [eligibilitycenter.org](#) for information on NCAA initial-eligibility requirements.
- » Use NCAA Research's [interactive map](#) to help locate NCAA schools you're interested in attending.
- » Find your high school's list of NCAA-approved core courses at [eligibilitycenter.org/courselist](#) to ensure you're taking the right courses, and earn the best grades possible!

## 10<sup>th</sup> GRADE PLAN



- » If you're being actively recruited by an NCAA school and have a Profile Page account, [transition](#) it to the required [certification account](#).
- » Monitor the [task list](#) in your NCAA Eligibility Center account for next steps.
- » At the end of the school year, ask your high school counselor from each school you attend to upload an official transcript to your Eligibility Center account.
- » If you fall behind academically, ask your high school counselor for help finding [approved courses](#) you can take.

## 11<sup>th</sup> GRADE STUDY



- » Ensure your [sports participation](#) information is correct in your Eligibility Center account.
- » Check with your high school counselor to make sure you're on track to complete the required number of NCAA-approved [core courses](#) and graduate on time with your class.
- » Share your [NCAA ID](#) with NCAA schools recruiting you so each school can place you on its [institutional request list](#).
- » At the end of the school year, ask your high school counselor from each school you attend to upload an official transcript to your Eligibility Center account.

## 12<sup>th</sup> GRADE GRADUATE



- » Request your final [amateurism certification](#) beginning April 1 (fall enrollees) or Oct. 1 (winter/spring enrollees) in your Eligibility Center account at [eligibilitycenter.org](#).
- » Apply and be accepted to the NCAA school you plan to attend.
- » Complete your final NCAA-approved [core courses](#) as you prepare for graduation.
- » After you graduate, ask your high school counselor to upload your final [official transcript](#) with proof of graduation to your Eligibility Center account.
